#### **Reading Spine**

Within this document there are **three reading spines** which we would like you to use to support the teaching and learning of reading and writing.

#### **Author Study Spine**

This spine contains a variety of high quality books which we would like you to read with your class on a weekly basis.

#### Curriculum Spine

This spine has a variety of fiction, non fiction and poetry texts which have been sourced to compliment your writing genres. We reconmend using these to support the teaching of writing units and whole class reading lessons. If you have other high-quality reading texts which you would like to use, please feel free to do so.

#### Reading For Pleasure Spine

We would like all children to develop a love of reading, and understand which books they enjoy and why that may be. There is a reading for pleasure spine designed for EYFS up to Year 6. Within each spine there are a large selection of high quality texts which aim to provide depth and breadth to the children's reading. Within the Reading for Pleasure Spine we have also created a selection of non-fiction texts which support the development of background knowledge, and provide additional reading for those children who enjoy non-fiction texts. The book recomendations may also be used to support the teaching of specific subject areas, whole class reading, or they can be accessed independently by the children.







#### Reading Spine Aims

'From the earliest ages, reading is much more than decoding. From the start, reading is also accessing and further acquiring language knowledge and domain knowledge. This means that instruction and practice in fluency of decoding need to be accompanied by instruction and practice in vocabulary and domain knowledge. If we want to raise later achievement ..., we need to combine early instruction in the procedures of literacy with early instruction in the content of literacy, specifically: vocabulary, conventions of language, and knowledge of the world.'

The aim of this reading spine is to provide an extensive list of high quality texts which staff can use to apply to thier own long term plans. These are books to use as class reads, as study books for writing, as whole class reading books, and as recommendations for reading corners. Extracts may be taken from texts to explore in greater detail.

We aim for by the time a child reaches year 6 and beyond, they have developed rich vocabulary and broader knowledge of the world, and as a result of this are able to access more complex books expected of them in secondary school.

It should be noted that book and text selection not only considers narratives and poems, but also recognises that a good balance of topic-appropriate non-fiction should be read to help further develop children's background knowledge of the subject they are studying.

#### High Quality Texts for All

The collection has been designed to introduce children to a growing range of texts. Whilst some children may not be able to read all of the books independently, an important function of the collection is to expose children so they can access a wider range of titles, authors and genres. For more experienced readers, the collection offers an increasingly challenging range of books.

When selecting the books we considered three areas: learning to read; access to high quality texts to enable access for all; and to promote reading for pleasure and experiential and language develoment through information texts.

#### Learning to Read

The early reading books are particularily supportive for children who are learning to read. These books help children behave like readers, These books may be:

- Memorable texts that feature repetition and encourage predictions
- Texts within which rhythm and rhyme are important
- Texts that allow children to practice and apply thier phonic knowledge
- Texts which positivley reflect children's interests and backgrounds
- Books with suportive illustrations
- Books that draw attention to written language and the way books work
- Texts that are multi-layered- capable of being read at different levels
- Books that deal with important themes
- Books in which language is used in lively, inventive ways
- Books by skillful and experienced childrens writers and illustrators
- Traditional and contempory 'classics' of childrens literature
- Stories from different cultural settings
- Texts that promote discussion and reflection
- Books with text and pictures that provide comprehensive information, which are also an enjoyable reading experience, broadening knowledge, vocabulary, and experience of the world.

The texts have been selected through recomendations: National Literacy Trust, Little Wandle Letters and Sounds, The Book Trust, Books for Topics, Chesnut Books and more.

Considerations have been made for areas of learning covered in the curriculum to ensure wider reading.

# Upper Key Stage Two Core Text Overview

These are the core texts used in each class for the year 2023/2024. We have carefully selected each text for a specific reason. We believe that all children should read these books by the time they leave Rosedale. By the end of Y6 we aim for Rosedale pupils to have read a large breath of texts which have supported vocabulary development, understanding of the world, awareness of current world themes, and an understanding of much-loved authors. Each text supports a carefully organised and progressive plan for writing, where the children can enjoy texts and develop as readers, but then also write as authors. Through this we are supporting even the most disadvantaged pupils to become creative and literate, whilst also demonstrating and expressing themselves through their writing. There are 4 stands of core texts as we progress through the year.



C.S Lewis has been drawing children into this magical land with unforgettable characters for over sixty years.

In this classic fantasy Four adventurous siblings-Peter, Susan, Edmund, and Lucy Pevensie- step through a wardrobe door and into the land of Narnia, a land frozen in eternal winter and enslaved by the power of the White Witch. But when almost all hope is lost, the return of the Great Lion, Aslan, signals a great change and a great sacrifice.

The Explorer is an exciting and gripping adventure that sees four children learning to survive as they journey through unfamiliar and challenging circumstances. This book transports you to a richly drawn land and you will find yourself right there with the children as they follow a map to a lost city, eating tarantulas and swimming with river dolphins.

Katherine Rundell's The Explorer is a perfect class read for children learning about rainforests, the Amazon, friendships, resilience and much more.

#### Oliver Twist -Charles Dickins




The classic Dickensian tale of a little boy who wanted more.

Oliver Twist is orphaned and on the streets of London. Alone and vulnerable, he forms a new kind of family with a group of pickpockets. At first Oliver's new family provides a sense of hope, but it is not long before the true colours of London's underclass reveals itself: scheming, desperation and greed surround Oliver, making his prospects of happiness seem bleak. But this young boy, who never seems to stop running, is nothing like those he runs from.

Oliver Twist is a mesmerising story of childhood and, ultimately, of success against the odds.

There's a Boy at the Back of the Class -Oniali Rauf



Told with heart and humour, The Boy at the Back of the Class is a child's perspective on the refugee crisis, highlighting the importance of friendship and kindness in a world that doesn't always make sense.

Ahmet is nine years old but he's very strange. He never talks and never smiles and doesn't like sweets — not even lemon sherbets.

But then the class learned the truth: Ahmet really isn't very strange at all. He's a refugee who's run away from a War. A real one. With bombs and fires and bullies that hurt people.

What drives so many to leave everything behind and journey alone to a mysterious country, a place without family or friends, where everything is nameless and the future is unknown? This wordless masterpiece explores how the immigrant must navigate his way through his sense of deep displacement and find a way of connecting with the people he meets. This compelling book captures the brave act of leaving everything behind and searching for a future in another world.
